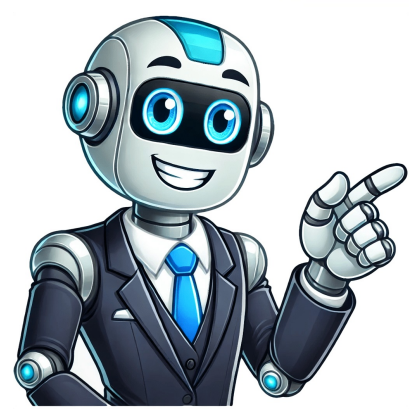

Chief has a dream of himself as a muscled version saving Dog Man and Milly from Dr. Scum and his Robo Shark Duck. After that, he and Dog Man started flying through the sky while a parody of the song "The Greatest Love of All" is in the background. He wakes up due to his phone ringing, and is informed that Dog Man was injured in the line of duty. Chief rushes quickly to the cop station only to discover that Dog Man was injured in the line of doodie, while drinking out of a toilet bowl, and then the toilet bowl lid slamming on his fingers. Chapter 2: The Cone of Shame[]Chief is very surprised that Dog Man is wearing a cone and the Nurse Lady tells him that he has to wear it for a few days. He takes Dog Man home, and Nurse Lady says she notices (and likes) Chief's slippers. Chief is happy (although, his expression looks like he has a crush on Nurse Lady). Chief leaves, and Dog Man describes how the day went to Lil' Petey and 80-HD. Both try to assure him that everything is gonna be okay and leave the "Supa Pillow Fort." They then go up to the grand ballroom.Chapter 3: Escape from Cat Jail[]Grampa tries to escape from Cat Jail using the Cupcake Exit, but Big Jim (as Commander Cupcake) has installed a security mechanism so Grampa can't get through. Big Jim claims only him and his cardboard robot can escape. Grampa then claims that it needs a battery. Big Jim runs up to get the battery, while Grampa climbs into Big Jim's robot.Chapter 4: Cone of Destiny[]Lil' Petey and 80-HD are inventing a new Mecha-Cone Suit for Dog Man. They return to the Supa Pillow Fort and take off the old cone from Dog Man and replace it with a new one. Dog Man is happy with the new cone, and Lil' Petey dubs it "The Cone of Destiny". Lil' Petey tells Dog Man if he ever needs help, just press the button on the top, and all of his dreams will come true. Dog Man rushes out of the house to the police station, knocking over Petey who has come to pick Lil' Petey up for the week. Dog Man arrives at the police station and the Mean Officers start bullying him because of his cone. Dog Man presses the button on the top, which causes him to throw away his Mecha-Suit. The mean officers run away in fright after this encounter, and they hide behind the plant Dog Man usually hides behind. Dog Man turns off the Mecha-Suit and discovers that Chief is writing a love letter to Nurse Lady. Dog Man doesn't like the letter, and expresses this by blowing a raspberry. Chief crumples it up and throws it away and admits that he'll always be alone. Dog Man then comforts Chief after realizing what he's done.Chapter 6: The Playdate[]Big Jim returns with a battery from Grampa's alarm clock. Grampa made a note that he "escaped" while Big Jim was getting the batteries. After tossing the battery into the head of the robot, Big Jim is convinced that the robot came alive. Grampa (disguised as the robot) says that they need Living Spray and Cannery Grow "because cupcakes are delicious forever". They exit through the Cupcake Exit and run off to find the ingredients. Meanwhile, Petey employs 80-HD to fix Petey and Son. Petey gives Lil' Petey a bath, telling him that Sarah is going to interview him on his former villainous life. Suddenly, the doorbell rings, and Lil' Petey jumps out of the bathtub to answer it, causing Petey to clean up the spilled water. Later, Lil' Petey asks Petey if Molly can come over to play, and Petey says no, unbeknownst to him that Molly has already arrived. Petey lets Molly and Lil' Petey play downstairs, as long as they don't mess up the interview. Chapter 7: A Buncha Stuff That Happened Next[]Dog Man digs up roses from Mayor's newly renovated garden. He drops them off at the hospital, expecting Nurse Lady to give them to Chief, but she shares them with her patients. Meanwhile, Grampa and Big Jim go from store to store trying to find Living Spray and Cannery Grow, with no avail. When they ask Kinney, he says that Living Spray was banned due to complaints, and the Cannery Grow factory was destroyed in book 15; Dog Man: Lord of the Fleas. Meanwhile, Sarah, her cameraman, and Zuzu arrive at Petey's house where 80-HD is fixing it up. Petey welcomes them, calling Zuzu "little doggy", causing her to growl at him. They begin the interview, but Lil' Petey and Molly interrupt with a parody of "If You're Happy and You Know It". They request a snack, specifically chips. Later, they were thirsty and asked for "chip dip" from Petey. But he don't have any. Molly then takes a bite of one saying that they taste way better with chip dip, causing Petey to say once again that he's out. Then Lil' Petey and Molly leave where Molly calls Petey, "Wally", causing Sarah to ask why she calls him "Wally", where Petey says, "I HAVE NO IDEA!!"Chapter 8: Becoming Petey[] Grampa and Big Jim ask the people at Cal and Bunga's for living spray. Grampa and Big Jim try going to Cal and Bunga's surf shop for living spray, but to no avail. Sarah interviews Petey when he shows her around his lab. Grampa decides to go steal the living spray from Petey's home. Dog Man tries again to give Nurse Lady a romantic gesture with a box of chocolates but she accepts them for her staff. Molly and Lil' Petey interrupt again, this time singing a parody of "Twinkle, Twinkle, Little Star" requesting for a drink because "Potato chips can get pretty dry if you don't have chip dip." So they walk to fridge where Petey has apple juice and cranberry juice, while Lil' Petey and Molly interrupted Petey by saying apple. Petey pours some apple juice into sippy cups where Molly asks for real cups because "Sippy cups are for babies." Then Petey mentions that "Last week you kids spilled cherry juice all over the couch!" and replies to Molly by saying "... It's either sippy cups or nothing!" Then they leave, then drop their sippy cups where Molly asks why Wally is such a grouch today.Chapter 9: The Bad Old Days[]Petey takes Sarah and the kids on a walk to continue the interview. Petey tells about his first prison. Jail 4 Cats. He says he could not rehabilitate completely after his time, so he became a villain. Meanwhile, Grampa and Big Jim arrive at Petey's lab, where they greet 80-HD. Grampa goes downstairs but slips on the sippy cups that contained the apple juice that Lil' Petey and Molly received from Petey. He loses his disguise and Big Jim starts defying him, knocking over a can of living spray, which brings the two sippy cups to life. They get hit with growing spray and ultimately destroy Petey and Son.Chapter 10: Night of the Living Sippy Cups[]80-HD finished fixing Petey and his son's home, when the sippy cups destroyed it and 80-HD has to start all over again! The sippy cups are on the loose, and capture Grampa and Big Jim. 80-HD tries to defeat the sippy cups, but one of them squirts at him with apple juice, causing him to fall apart. The malic acid from the apple juice destroys 80-HD. Then, the same sippy cup swallows him. The second sippy cup eats Grandpa and Big Jim. Grampa calls Big Jim "buddy." Big Jim tortures Grampa later on for the rest of the book for this, sparking their argument. Meanwhile, Lil' Petey and Molly entertain Sarah with their silly songs, to Petey's chagrin. They use outhouses because they need the bathroom. Petey takes Sarah to where it all began.Chapter 11: Where It All Began[]Petey tells Sarah that he moved to Happy Home Shelter when he was little with his mother, even though they were very poor his mother gave him love. Even after she passed away, Petey felt that love with Lil' Petey and thinks that love can last forever. Sarah ends the show, and can't think of anything going wrong. Then, Sarah, Petey, Lil' Petey and her cameraman are snatched by the sippy cups and Sarah admits that something has gone wrong.Chapter 12: Big Fight[]The sippy cups eat the gang, but Molly is still safe. She leaves the sippy cup and controls its mind with her psychokinesis. The other sippy cup sprays her, and she finds out about the destruction of Petey and Son and worries that Wally is going to be mad. Meanwhile, Chief and Dog Man have gone through millions of love notes to Nurse Lady at the station, but can't come up with the perfect one. Nurse Lady calls them to the hospital, so they run for her. Petey is annoyed. At the sight of Petey and Son, Petey is distraught. Molly asks to take the meerkat suit home. Petey sarcastically says yes as he just lost everything. Molly believes he isn't being sarcastic and flies away. Lil' Petey then finds Petey's mother's Ukulele, and Petey plays a few notes, because he thought he lost it. Lil' Petey takes Petey to live with him and Dog Man while Petey and Son is rebuilt. Lil' Petey says they still have love and that it lasts forever. Following up with Petey hugging his son and saying: "Forever and ever" while heading back to the doghouse where Dog Man was waiting for them. Trivia[]In Chief's dream, the musical interlude in Chapter 1 is a parody of the song, "The Greatest Love of All" by Michael Masser, with lyrics by Linda Creed.Chapter 2's title, "The Cone of Shame," may be a reference to the cone of shame from the movie Up.Petey's red cardigan sweater and tie were based on the clothing often worn by beloved children's television host, Fred Rogers from Mister Rogers' Neighborhood.On page 123, Petey is paraphrasing John 8:7 (New International Version) from the Bible.When they kept on questioning him, he straightened up and said to them, "Let any one of you who is without sin be the first to throw a stone at her." John 8:7 nivPetey's youthful "mistakes" and "bad choices" were chronicled in the graphic novel where he made his primary debut, Super Diaper Baby 2: The Invasion of the Potty Snatchers.The title of Chapter 15 is the final line of the 1927 song, "Stardust" by Hoagy Carmichael, with lyrics by Mitchell Parish.This book was inspired by the two songs mentioned above, the quote on page 6 and the law of conservation and energy (a.k.a. the first law of thermodynamics).On page 91, Sarah Hatoff says "Heeeeee's Petey!!!!" This is probably a reference to "Johnny" from "The Shining."On the fridge which Petey get the juice from has a Lil' Petey made Drawing of Petey.Big Jim and Grampa make a cameo after they started arguing about Grampa calling Big Jim "buddy" when they were in the pink Sippy Cup.This is the first Dog Man book not to feature a George & Harold intro or a recap of "Our Story Thus Far."Piggy was originally intended to appear in this book, but never appeared. His return might've been scrapped.The last pages did not show any spoilers of Dog Man 11 or Cat Kid Comic Club: Perspectives.Petey's flashback shows the parts from Books 3 and 6.A collection of evil stuff can be seen when Petey shows Sarah Hatoff his dangerous items. These are references to the past books in the series.The Fourth Wall was broken 4 Times in this book.When Kinney says to Grampa and Big Jim that the Cannery Grow Factory was destroyed in book 5.When Sarah and Petey see the hospital patients eating the candy and then Sarah says, "Speaking of weird transitions..."Twice when Lil' Petey acknowledges Petey's thought bubbles.This has also happened in book 5.Molly mentioned Batman in this book.This is the second time someone has mentioned Batman. The first was when Lil' Petey in Dog Man: Grime and Punishment was not the end of the series. This new installment includes a romantic subplot between Chief and Nurse Lady, a bit more about Petey's mother (hence the title), giant evil animated sippy cups, lots of malic acid, and some references to the first law of thermodynamics. Oh, and poop jokes. Lots of poop jokes, because apparently the series had not actually moved beyond poop humor so much as to take a brief scenic detour away from it.As with most of the more recent Dog Man books, the serious stuff here was quite well done, and never felt like it slowed things down or weighed things down. The bathroom humor has never been a favorite of mine, but my son (13 now) still finds it hilarious. The main source of much of this was Molly's psychokinetic tadpole, who is Lil' Petey's best friend, which seemed a bit weird because this wasn't an aspect of her character in previous appearances.I did feel like this relied a bit too much on tropes and gimmicks from previous installments, while not adding too much to the longer-term plotlines. That being said, it was still cute fun, with several really great jokes.April 20, 2021Dog Man has been forced to wear the Cone of Shame, but Lil Petey can help make it more fun. Reading Level: Middle Grades, ages 7-9 Recommended for: ages 6-10 If you have any 6-year-old boys in the house, you may already know George and Harold, the 4th-grade comic artists whose adventures with Principal Krupp, a.k.a. Captain Underpants, became the stuff of legend. Just as Capt. Underpants was running its course, the two friends happened upon a stash of comics they wrote earlier. These were such a riot they decided to share them with us loyal readers, and thus Dog Man The Dog Man universe, like the Capt. U and Marvel and DC and every other universe, contains its cast of recurring characters. The title character is the result of a dastardly trick paid by Petey, the Worlds Most Evilst Cat, who planted a bomb for for the police. Officer Knight and Greg the Dog discovered it, and in the ensuing explosion, Knights head and Greps body were damaged beyond repair. Loyal & true Nurse Lady suggested joining the mans body and the dogs head, which worked out brilliantly because Greg was the smart one anyway. Petseys evil plot backfired as Dog Man became an implacable foe. Over the course of 13 volumes, Petey reforms and tries to become a better version of himself. But other villains are always waiting in the wings, along with explosions, monsters, robots, and monstrous robots. Since it was supposedly conceived by a pair of imaginative 4th-graders when they were in 1st grade, the Dog Man books are for a slightly younger age group than Captain Underpants. The artistic quality is about what youd expect from a pair of imaginative 4th-graders. Pilky has a lot of fun with subtitles, as in A Tale of Two Kitties, Lord of the Fleas, Fetch-22, and the latest, Mothering Heights. Readers who don't get the literary references can expect plenty of bathroom humor and behavior of which grownups dont approve. In the original volume Mrs. Congreve, George and Harold's teacher, feels compelled send a letter home to the boys parents about their inappropriate comic. I haven't read every book in the series, but Mothering Heights features song parodies about diarrhea, which is probably typical. Parents be warned about what they might hear their 7-year-old belting out in the shower. (Mothering Heights also features a paraphrase from John 8:7, referenced in the end notes. Go figure.) On the positive side, Dog Man is sweet-tempered and true blue (as well as a very sloppy kisser) and Petseys struggles to be a better cat are both touching and commendable. Love and kindness win out over dastardly schemes every timeyou have to wonder why the bad guys keep coming back for more. There's no question why the kids clamor for more Dog Man. Parents can make up their own minds about potty jokes, but I think most readers know whats acceptable at the dinner table. Or if not, this is one way to learn.
